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NAFTA'S LEGACY: GROWING U.S. TRADE DEFICITS COST 682,900 JOBS

Former President Bill Clinton claimed that NAFTA would create an "export boom to Mexico" that would create 200,000 jobs in two years and a million jobs in five years, "many more jobs than will be lost" due to rising imports. The economic logic behind his argument was clear: Trade creates new jobs in exporting industries and destroys jobs when imports replace the output of domestic firms. Fast forward 20 years and it's clear that things didn't work out as Clinton promised. NAFTA led to a flood of outsourcing and foreign direct investment in Mexico. U.S. imports from Mexico grew much more rapidly than exports, leading to growing trade deficits, as shown in the Figure. Jobs making cars, electronics, and apparel and other goods moved to Mexico, and job losses piled up in the United States, especially in the Midwest where those products used to be made. By 2010, trade deficits with Mexico had eliminated 682,900 good U.S. jobs, most (60.8 percent) in manufacturing. Claims by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce that NAFTA "trade" has created millions of jobs are based on disingenuous accounting, which counts only jobs gained by exports but ignores jobs lost due to growing imports. The U.S. economy has grown in the past 20 years *despite* NAFTA, not because of it. Worse yet, production workers' wages have suffered in the United States. Likewise, workers in Mexico have not seen wage growth. Job losses and wage stagnation are NAFTA's real legacy.

IAM MIDWEST TERRITORY SCORES WIN FOR 1700 IN MISSOURI

District Lodge 66 took part in the successful effort to gain representation for the employees of ATK Ammunition in Independence MO. Two volunteers from Local Lodge 1030, Lodge President Neil Kamrowski and Lodge Communicator Ron Kamrowski, responded to the request from Midwest Territory and spent nearly two weeks in Missouri. Working with volunteers from around the nation and the Grand Lodge, Neil and Ron served us well as representatives of District 66.

Workers at the Independence, MO plant that serves as the Defense Department's primary source for military 5.56 mm, 7.62 mm and .50-caliber rifle ammunition voted recently to become the newest members of the IAM in Kansas City, MO.

The 1,730 employees at Alliant Techsystems (ATK) Lake City Army Ammunition Plant (LCAAP) stuck together in the face of a hostile anti-union effort by the company and a government shutdown which delayed their election by two weeks.

Key issues in the organizing effort included outsourcing, a draconian management style and a refusal by the company to honor seniority. In addition to a pension freeze and cuts to the 401(k) program, the majority of employees at ATK had not seen a raise in two years.

"Numerous attempts have been made to organize this facility over the past 72 years," said Midwest Territory GVP Phil Gruber. "It's a testament to the determination of these employees that they overcame every obstacle and succeeded where many others came up short."

The successful IAM campaign featured traditional employee meetings, house calls by volunteers and hand billing, as well as a social media component that included emails, text messages and phone banking.

"Congratulations to everyone involved in this campaign, especially the workers at ATK," said IAM Headquarters GVP Bob Martinez.
